The letter follows:

"To the Dear People the Darrtown M. E. Church:

Since limitation will not permit our being present, the next best we can do is write some lines.

Maybe some of our older living friends will be interested to know we think of them today and of the years gone by, when our communion together in services of Thanksgiving and our humble desire to serve God brought joy and peace to us all. In those days of the church away back, in 1873-74, when our pastor came down from Camden and Billy McCord would come from Oxford to help out on extra occasions. I used to ride horseback over the country to get contributions for defray the churches' expenses. This was long before the "Envelope System" was thought of.

Then we think of James Bradberry, ever faithful in attendance who held the church dear to his heart. If we could be with you today, we would see many faces of good people holding up the pillars of the church and some dear ones we used to be co-workers with.
