Our mail carrier made a mistake yesterday and put one of my letters onto one of my neighbers boxs and came to me at church and handed me my letter and behold you. It was from Brother Lease and I am so glad that I can tell you of it. He sounded so pleased to know that I had found such a good friend and he said that he was so glad to have the oppertunity of writing you a letter and said that he hoped to see both of us next summer.

My dear I saw Harrie Hook at church. He did not yet get of to Dayton last week but sys that he is going this week and Joe Burns came home from Indiana to day. Sys he got 42 rabits and qual [quail]. I dont remember what he said but he reports a good time and has come to see his girl to night.

My dear I would be so glad if I could see you to night and have a little talk. I expect you ar thinking of me and meby writing some good lines if you did not go to church. Dear Eva I promest you a short letter this time and if I keep my promes I will have to quit perty soon. Tha brought me \$330 and I sold 4 hed of cattle that will go away on next Friday. I think that tha will bring about \$200 as I sold them by the pound.

Dear I expect that you received my letter this morning and that you ar writing to me to night. I will be expecting your dear letter on Thursday. Oh yes I got a letter from Frank Schneider to day. He told me that he had seen you and that you was all right but for me to hurry and come over or I would not get enney of Mr. Polsters wine that he had some that was right good and he still wants me to sell out hear and come in thare and bye a farm. We will see about that.

My dear the wether has got some what warmer. One weak from to night will be christmas eve. Our Sunday school is preparing for an intertainment of some kiend. I subpose you ar busy in that line to. I must write to my dear Brother and Sister Lewis & Martha before so verry long. Some of Joe Burns folks sent him some chestnuts and some fine apples. I was tasteing some of them to day and tha wer just all right.

Now my dear Eva I will not write enney mor to night but will think of something by to morrow night so good night my dear from your loving friend.

Well dear Eva I was down to Darrtown a little bit to night and have just come home and will write you a few lines before I retire tho I havend enney thing new or interesting to write to you to night onley that I am well and I hope this will fiend you the same. My dear it will soon be time for me to get a letter. I am all ways counting the time.

I was going to tell you that Will Burns told me yesterday that he thought that he mite go away before march. I think I will just let them go wen tha want to. I wont tell them nothing yet. My dear we ar having just lovely wether now. I wish we could have just such in Febuary. I know it would pleas us both.

Well I have been looking at your picture and all so over your last letter. I look at them a little wile everry evening. It is about all the real plesher I have. I beleave I told you that I would not write much to night as it is a little cool.

Joe Burns talks a little like he would go home soon

but I cant tell wether he will or not. Mrs Burns sold her turkeys to day. I was going to ask you if you wanted to rais turkeys next year. If you doo I had better speak for some turkeys some plase. I would get some from her but I did not like them verry well. Have to close for to night and hope to hear from you in due time.

You know how the peapel will look at you the first time that we go to church and I know you will look all right.

If thare is enney one that knows enney thing about me writing to enney one tha dont say enney thing to me about it. My mail carrier I think is thinking something but I dont think he sys enney thing to enney one. You spoke of the end of your school term. That will be all right. If it suld be a few days later we will never fall out about that. If everry thing els works out all right I will be satersfide. I am glad that Holmes ar good to you and have a good place to board.

My dear you told me of those nice and good cakes of sister Marthas. I bet that tha wer just all right and I onley wish that I sould of enjoyed some of them with you. Meby we will sometimes.

My dear I am so glad that you tell me that my letters ar so good to you. I think sometimes that tha mite be much better if only I knew how to make them that way but I think that you know that tha ar ment all right if I dont just get them that way. You asked me to excuse the looks of your letters. Now my dear your letters wer just all right and as sweet as it could be to me.

You said that you would trye and inform your Pap. My dear I surley want you to or have some one to. We will have him to come to see us in summer that is if he dont get too sponkey at us witch I hope he wont. Yes I expect you will be quite busy during hallow days. My dear Eva I expect you will get that little letter I sent you about tomorrow Friday and I hope you will be pleased with it. It is only a little bit of a gift. My Dear Friend Joe:-

I will tell you that I was most pleasantly surprised to get your letter and also your kind rememberance for Xmas. The letter carrier had left your letter and a package for me at Mrs. Gists' again. The package contained the school pictures I had spoken off to you, they are good pictures. My dear I put up the childern's treats tonight in little sacks I made the other night. Mrs. Holmes helped me some. I told you I had a cold, well, I am getting better, though I did not feel so well last night, or I would written some for you. There were some things you said in your letter I got Monday, I want

to say something more about.

You said you hoped neither of us was expecting too much of the other and maybe be a little dissapointed. Now My Dearest, you may not be all perfection and I may not be all perfection, but I expect to adapt myself to live so as to make you happy, and I am not setting myself up on anything, but that I expect to love you and will try to live to make you happy. And I know you will try to do your part toward me. And I can't see where we will be disappointed, I rather expect we will admire each other more than we even now think we will. I believe we will be perfectly happy together, and I think you believe it too. I just know your disposition and ways will suit me, and I am going to do all that is right, and I know you appreciate what is right, and desire this only, so I have no fear whatever but what I will be perfectly contented with you, and am not going to be a bit disappointed in you, and hope you will not be disappointed in me, for I have tried to be very plain in my letters to you so you might understand me, and I know I am sincere in all I say and have said.

My Dearest, you spoke of pap, well I shall tell him a little while before if I can, for the best. And I said I did not wish to go home before, I meant I would like to teach untill you were ready to come in after me, I don't want to stop teaching until near time anyway, we will decide this when I learn about the closing of this term and the Teacher's meeting. Frank Schneider came to school today and asked me to come over tomorrow night to make out his road reports. You know he is road supervisor and also a road commissioner. I also have Ed. Streeter's Bill to make out tomorrow night, and I don't expect to get time to write any for you, but beings I am writing often any way, you will know I think of you all the same.

My dear I have been right busy fixing for Xmas at the school, we have prepared a little programme for tomorrow evening. Then after it is over. Dora said she would take me home. I have a treat for Mrs. Ditman, I wish I could also hand you a treat. Dora went to church tonight, and asked me to go with her, but I had several letters to write. One I wrote to Mrs. Overholtzer, one to Mr. Meyers, or rather a note to him sending him the money for the school pictures, and I wrote to Baltimore to Perkins' Pharmacy, for a bitters for Dyspepsia, for Mrs Holmes, and then we always keep it too.

Joe my dear I will have a long holiday, but I have a lot laid out to do, and I guess the time will be short enough. School begins again Wednesday after New Year, and don't forget to direct your letters in care of letter carrier No. 7 during the holidays, and change again after New Year to Wagon B.

I said I would not write much, but I guess I will have to try to fill up this paper. Mrs. Ditman still has those pictures, she was busy the last time baking cakes, and said she had them upstairs so she would give them to me the next time. I want to stop for a few minutes tomorrow to give her a sack of candy etc. Excuse mistakes, I am just scratching this, but you will be able to read it. I hope you were pleased with my letter, which I suppose you got yesterday.

I hope you are well, I am feeling right good, my cold is much better. I wish you a Merry Christmas, my dearest, and you may be sure I shall think of you all the time any way. Write when you can, for me Monday or anytime next week for maybe you will have answered my letter when you get this. Love to you my dear good night.
